Breaking GCSE Records...

Students at Castle View Enterprise Academy have achieved our best- ever GCSE results of 99%, with just three students out of a cohort of 172 missing out on the benchmark five or more A\*-C grades. The results included some record-breaking performances including 59% of students obtaining at least one A or A\*. Of every single student in our care, 100% gained a least 5 A\*-G grades.

In the national benchmark of five or more A\*-C grades including English and Mathematics, CVEA scored outstandingly high results of 67% which is up 13% on last year and a massive 41% increase since the Academy opened. For the first time ever Castle View Enterprise Academy is above the National Average of 58%. Instead of a small minority, the vast majority leave us with English and Mathematicss at grade C or above. These results were boosted by an English pass rate of 73% and Maths of 74% which is the best the community of Castle View have ever seen.

A number of students achieved outstanding results with A/A\* in the core subjects of English, English Literature, Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry and Physics. The highest performing female student, Chantelle Bates, and the highest performing male students, Carl Brown and Ryan Mullen, gained 11 A/A\* and 10 A/A\* grades respectively.

The results arrived in the same year as OFSTED judged that the Academy was officially GOOD in all areas. We achieved this rating under the latest tough OFSTED framework that has seen many schools downgraded. These results are the worthy achievement of many hard-working young people and many dedicated teachers and support staff. I am so proud of our students and all that they have achieved during their time here at Castle View Enterprise Academy.

At Castle View Enterprise Academy we strongly believe in a 'hard work' ethic. Through this, all students can achieve their personal best, whatever it is. This is what we seek to instil through a caring, disciplined ethos and by encouraging students to take the broadest possible part in community life. So in celebrating these outstanding academic results we proudly highlight the achievements of all our young people in this magazine. Our students have worked exceptionally hard and credit must also go to our dedicated teaching staff, who have given many hours outside of normal school time to support students to achieve these results.



## Games Pastors at London 2012

This summer, our very own Mrs Roberts, Year 8 Student Welfare Officer, and her husband, had the opportunity of a life time; they became Team Heathrow Volunteers for the Thirtieth Olympic Games in London. For most of August, they worked at Heathrow Airport in Terminal 4 as Airport Meeters and Greeters. Their job was to ensure that arriving athletes knew where to go and that they were directed to the correct coaches in order to get to the Olympic Village.

Mrs Roberts said, "Meeting the athletes was an amazing experience; really interesting and very rewarding. We were often given pin badges from the countries the athletes were from.

We also worked as Games Pastors at Paddington Train Station, and also outside Buckingham Palace and in Hyde Park. The icing on the cake was when we won tickets to attend the closing ceremony of the Olympic Games. What an amazing experience! The arena was spectacular, the atmosphere was electric and the performances were amazing.

All the volunteers received a personal thank you letter and a replica London 2012 baton from Prime Minister David Cameron for all their hard work and efforts.

#### Let's Get Cooking

Let's Get Cooking is available to students from all year groups. Every week there is a new surprise recipe and everything you need is provided by the club, which includes ingredients and cooking utensils. You can also take the finished product home to eat!



Let's Get Cooking is a National Lottery funded organisation. The Academy receives funding every year and is able to access recipes at www.letsgetcooking.org.uk. The Academy currently has a waiting list of 24 students wishing to join the club. Due to funding, the club can only take on 10 people at a time; however, anyone is welcome to add their name to the waiting list. Each member receives their own password for the website to view and download recipes.

The club not only helps students brush up on their culinary skills, but also gives it members a chance to work on their team work skills. When the cooking is finished, the groups of students are given tasks, such as washing dishes and cleaning work surfaces. No one can leave until they've finished all of their tasks!

#### Sunderland Schools Triathlon



For a second year running, Castle View Enterprise Academy entered the Sunderland Schools Triathlon held in Silksworth in June. The competition involves swimming, cycling then running and team scores are collated on the overall time of each student in a team of four. We entered four teams of students from Years 7 to 10 and for some this was a new experience, as for the Year 7s, this was a big step up in distance from the previous years primary school competition.

All students were a credit to the Academy showing excellent team work, which was also encouraged by family and friends who turned up to support Team CVEA. Although we did not win any races, the year 9 and 10 girls came a well deserved 3rd place up against such strong talent. Well done to all students who participated.

## Paris - C'est Magnifique!



In October, a group of year 9, 10 and 11 students had the fantastic opportunity to sample French culture in the City of Light. The visit jointly organised by the Modern Foreign Language and Business departments allowed students studying GCSE French to practise their French speaking and listening skills whilst visiting French restaurants, shopping for souvenirs and travelling on the Metro

system. The Travel and Tourism students were able to research Paris as a tourist destination for their coursework. During their stay in Paris, students visited many of the key tourist attractions.

The tour started with a leisurely boat trip along the Seine and a visit to the Montparnasse Tower; the highest building in Paris with a breathtaking 360° view of the city. Students also got to see the most famous piece of artwork in the world, the Mona Lisa, during their tour of the Louvre museum. Other cultural highlights included visits to Sacre Coeur, Montmatre and Notre Dame all led by our fantastic tour guide, Mr Marsden. The tour concluded with a fun-packed day at EuroDisney; with the fearless among the group (again led by Mr Marsden!) taking on Space Mountain and Indiana Jones' Temple of Peril watched from the sidelines by Miss Binyon and Miss Heslop – well someone had to look after the bags!

# Cracking Cholera

In June, 29 gifted and talented students, along with Miss Watson and Mrs Smith, attended a 'Cracking Cholera' day at Newcastle University.

Sara Bird, Historian and Archive Librarian at the University, talked to the students about her passion for history and what her role at the University entails. The students had the opportunity to explore some very special and ancient publications; Morgan volunteered to exhibit a huge history book and Ryan Evans showed the group a hand drawn illustration from a very old medical journal.

The students then worked in teams to investigate the causes and treatment of cholera. The first incidence of cholera in England occurred in Sunderland in October 1831 when a ship, carrying sailors who had the disease, docked at the port. The ship was allowed to dock because the port authorities objected to, and therefore ignored, instructions from the government to quarantine all ships coming from the Baltic States.





From Sunderland, the disease made its way northwards into Scotland and southwards towards London. Before it had run its course the disease had claimed 52,000 lives. Cholera is caused by unsanitary conditions polluting the water, and affects areas recovering from emergency situations. Disasters such as floods and earthquakes often disrupt the water and sanitation systems, thereby increasing the likelihood of water becoming contaminated. In the afternoon the students worked in the medical labs with the degree students; using various ingredients including brandy, ginger, cayenne pepper, mustard seeds and oils. They made their personal herbal 'tinctures' (a form of medicine). The students were then given a host of diseases to investigate under the microscopes and challenged with identifying the patients suffering from cholera. Well done CVEA, you found all three!

# Seahouses Field Trip

On Thursday 13th October, 26 students studying GCSE Geography visited Seahouses, Northumberland. This is a popular location with tourists and it is said to be the 'Gateway to the Farne Islands. Famous for its outstanding natural beauty, superb attractions and boat trips to the islands, this small seaside town is the most popular holiday resort on the Northumberland Coast, catering for large numbers of both day-visitors and longer-stay holidaymakers each year.





Seahouses has an interesting harbour, magnificent beaches and sand dunes. Seahouses Harbour, also known as 'North Sunderland Harbour', is a bustling place with fishing boats, diving boats and pleasure craft taking visitors to the Farne Islands. It is also a stop-over for yachts cruising around the coast, or beyond.

The students spent the day collecting data for their GCSE controlled assessment piece. With the focus of the piece being 'challenges created by tourism', Seahouses was the perfect location. They carried out a range of data collection tasks from traffic counts to environmental quality surveys and questionnaires. Many of the local people and visitors were keen to share their views with the students. As ever, our students displayed a mature, respectful and positive attitude.

Overall, it was a very successful day enjoyed by all.

# Groundworks



A community garden built on the site of a former derelict eyesore has been officially opened.

Residents came together to mark the completion of the Castletown Environmental Improvements Programme, at St Margaret's Avenue, Sunderland. The three-year project, managed by Groundwork and funded by the Community Spaces programme, included the demolition of rundown garages, which had been targeted by vandals.

Large paved areas were also removed and replaced with trees, shrubs and grassed areas. Claire Hutchinson, senior project officer at Groundwork, stated that because the location had originally been classed as "adopted highway", staff had to be given the legal go-ahead before work could start.

"The project has been the culmination of the ideas and hard work of local people for many years. In 2009, Groundwork became involved and managed to draw a variety of partners and funders round the table, to see the residents' visions through to completion. We are really grateful to all who supported the scheme. It has been a long process but we are all very happy with the results."

The development has also been praised by residents, who have endured years of antisocial behaviour at the site.

"The residents would like to thank everyone involved in the project and for making it a great success. We believe the project will enhance the quality of life for all the residents living in the area, and provide a safer place for the young children playing on the adjacent park." said householder Jimmy Burnicle.

The scheme was also supported by the Big Lottery Fund, Castletown Neighbourhood Action Group, Gentoo and city councillors Steve Foster and Denny Wilson.

Councillor Wilson said: "I want to thank all those involved in bringing this project to completion. The project is a great example of everyone working together to design out antisocial behaviour, by landscaping an area that was a community liability into a community asset that should enhance the quality of life for residents living there, and users of the adjacent park."

As well as a ribbon-cutting ceremony, the opening event also saw youngsters from the Academy take part in a scavenger hunt.

# Professor Brainstorm

Year 7 students were enthralled and amazed by a recent visit from Professor Brainstorm. The Professor performed and demonstrated a host of fascinating scientific concepts using everyday materials. The visit was arranged in order to help students broaden their scientific understanding of everyday phenomena.
