BBC Newcastle Studio Tour



Jeff Brown and Carol Malia had better watch out as Castle View's very own Press Pack have proven their worth as budding presenters and journalists on their recent visit to the BBC Newcastle Television and Radio Studios.

On Tuesday 6th December the Press Pack, made up of promising journalists from Year 8, took the short trip to the BBC Newcastle studios. They were treated to a behind-the-scenes trip around the whole building, getting a rare glimpse of how a working TV and radio studio operates. Firstly, the students were given a brief history of BBC Newcastle, including the infamous Byker Grove, which had the BBC staff reminiscing about PJ and Duncan!

The group was then taken into the basement of the building and allowed to rummage through the archive footage which dates back well into the 1970s. Next came the exciting part where students were able to experiment with the equipment in the TV studios, first visiting the studio where the weather is recorded. The students were amazed to see how the camera was programmed to work independently; recognising what height each presenter needs the camera to be. Moving on to the bigger studio the group were entrusted on the £63,000 floor of the newly refurbished TV studio where the daily 'Look North' programme is filmed. The students and staff took the opportunity to sit on the famous red sofa (pictured above).

However, the best was most definitely saved for last. At the end of the tour, the students were taken to their very own recording studio with staging and props, and invited to produce their own three-minute news show. Morgan took the position as field reporter while Ben was the anchor man in the studio; Mr Willis bravely took the role of weather reporter. All three performed exceptionally well under pressure, reporting on a boat crash and a restaurant designed for sheep! All students thoroughly enjoyed the day and gained a valuable insight into how the world of TV works. Morgan and Ben definitely have a hidden talent for presenting; so watch this space as we may have the next generation of news broadcasters.



Roving Reporter

As you will have noticed in this edition of the Castle Views'
Newsletter, the majority of articles have been written by a group of Year 8 students who have a keen interest in journalism and media.

During the tour, one of our 'Press Pack' group, Morgan Ozuzu (pictured above) compiled a list of frequently asked questions from previous tours of the BBC Newcastle Studios. He whittled these questions down to the three most popular ones that the tour guides are asked by almost every group. Here are his questions.

What effects does the BBC use?

BBC uses a lot of lighting and sound-proofing and control it by using a gallery when they go live on the air. The lighting is used so no shadows appear on the floor and sound-proofing makes sure that no echoes can be heard, since the studio is actually massive.

How does the background image appear on weather forecasts?

A special screen called a chromakey (green screen) is placed behind the person and it will magically appear to the camera as the desired background image.

What does the BBC do with the records of every show?

They keep all of the records in a special archive from the early 1970s to the present day. Roughly, there are a staggering 17,890 records of the BBC's shows.
